#### Active to schools - Tag On initiative

On the 31st of July student Ester and Tobias presented to the school council on behalf of the Active to Schools group. They revealed dacollected that at Newington Primary School:

<u>84%</u> of students get to school by car

1.3% of students take the bus to school

<u>12.7%</u> Or students get to school most days by a mode of active transport

To improve the percentage of students arriving at school in an active way, Ester and Tobias suggested that we implement the Tag On system.



#### How Tag On works

- Tag On consists of a kiosk with a touch screen monitor. Students are provided with their own data tag, which they use each day to 'tag on' at the kiosk.
- As students arrive at school, they 'tag on' at the kiosk and use the touch screen to select how they travelled to school: walk, ride, car or public transport.
- Each time students use the system, they earn Individual and House Active Travel Points. The kiosk displays real-time individual and house active travel tally boards at every tag on. Parents receive an email when the student tags on, acknowledging that their child has arrived safely.
- Tag On can send an email or SMS notification to parents when their child tags on at school. This reassures parents that their child has arrived safely.

A combination of council funding and fundraising will help get this initiate up and running.

Adele 1T


I am a smelly dinosaur And I am a good mum, I am a busy mum I need to feed my baby's tum.
