Our Year 1 students are making an admirable effort to be 'Care Bears'.

Linking up with their current Unit of Inquiry, we have been exploring minibeasts and how to best care for them (along with the planet). We have seen some wonderful creativity with the building and development of 'Bug Homes', initiative to create signs and also made some very cute little minibeasts that went home.

Over the past two weeks, Year 1 students have been outside and modelling our Learner Profile fantastically. Raking our gardens and pulling out weeds has definitely allowed us to work up a sweat!

Our Year 4 students have placed a huge focus on being reflective learners. Working as a team they have begun preparing our chicken garden for Spring (when we plan to incubate our own eggs) and clearing out the vegetable garden beds ready to plant our next lot of seedlings.




Billy G's Gourmet Cookie and Biscuit Dough Fundraiser

Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge

The Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge is now open and Newington Primary School is excited to be participating. The PRC application offers a range of exciting features including:

- · access to a library catalogue (including book images and blurbs)
- · a modern user-friendly interface
- · rewarding students with badges as challenge milestones are achieved
- the option for students to mark books as a favourite, give them a star rating or complete a book review

The Challenge is open to all Victorian children from birth to Year 10 in recognition of the importance of reading for literacy development. It is not a competition; but a personal challenge for children to read a set number of books by 6 September 2024.

Children from Prep to Year 2 are encouraged to read or 'experience' 30 books with their parents and teachers. Children from Year 3 to Year 10 are challenged to read 15 books.

All children who meet the Challenge will receive a certificate of achievement signed by the Victorian Premier and former Premiers.
